Dear Ms. Psaki:

The House Committee on Foreign Affairs is investigating the Biden Administration's August 2021 withdrawal from Afghanistan. Given your service as White House Press Secretary throughout 2021, with significant involvement in matters related to Afghanistan, you are a critical witness for this investigation. The Committee requests that you appear for a transcribed interview.

Please arrange by no later than 5:00 p.m. EDT on September 18, 2023 for this transcribed interview to be scheduled.

Congress' oversight powers are derived from the U.S. Constitution and have been repeatedly affirmed by the United States Supreme Court.<sup>1</sup> Under House Rule X, the Committee has legislative and oversight jurisdiction over "[r]elations of the United States with foreign nations generally," "[d]iplomatic service," and "[p]rotection of American citizens abroad and expatriation."<sup>2</sup> Furthermore, 22 U.S.C. § 2680 states, "The Department of State shall keep the Committee on Foreign Relations of the Senate and the Committee on Foreign Affairs of the House of Representatives fully and currently informed with respect to all activities and
